



## What makes the Jadis Ode different from other high-end integrated amps?

### 1. It prioritizes “tone first” engineering.

Most modern amplifiers—even expensive ones—are designed around:

- measurements
- bandwidth
- distortion figures

Many amps claim Class A but:

- slide into AB under load
- or only operate in Class A at low power

The Ode:

- runs full-time Class A
- delivers 25W in pure Class A push-pull

Result:

- continuous current flow
- no crossover distortion
- smoother, more continuous sound

But also means: heat, weight and inefficiency.

Jadis chooses sound over practicality.

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### 4. It's intentionally "old-school" in a modern market.

The Ode has:

- no DAC
- no phono
- no streaming
- only analog inputs

That's not a limitation—it's a philosophy. Jadis believes: every extra circuit = sonic compromise

So the Ode behaves more like a high-end preamp + power amp in one chassis.

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### 5. It's voiced like a musical instrument.

This is subtle but important. Jadis doesn't just assemble parts—they:

- listen and tune
- match tubes individually
- voice the final product

The goal: "convey the essence of music... every instrument reveals its character"

This is closer to how: a violin maker voices an instrument than how most electronics are engineered.

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### 6. It's not a "tube cliché" sound.

A lot of people expect:

- soft bass
- rolled-off highs
- overly romantic mids

The Ode is different:

- still rich and colorful
- but more open, extended, and dynamic
- better control than many EL34-based designs

Think: density + space, not just warmth

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## 7. It's built like a lifetime product.

- Hand-wired
- Serviceable
- No reliance on chips or digital boards
- Tubes replaceable indefinitely

Many modern integrated amps:

- become obsolete (DAC, streaming tech ages)

The Ode:

- can sound relevant 20–30 years from now
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## The honest trade-offs (important).

To keep it real—this amp is not for everyone:

Cons:

- Only 25W → Jadis amps drive difficult loads, but compatible speakers still benefit
- Runs hot (true Class A)
- Expensive for the feature set
- No convenience features

Translation: You're paying for sound quality and craftsmanship—not functionality.

- Not about specs
- Not about features
- Not about power
